Japan Log and Lumber Imports: Canada and US 2015

There was little change last year in Japan's import volumes of North American lumber, and of US logs, according to *Japan Lumber Journal* Friday. Japan's imports of Canadian logs, however, dropped significantly in both volumes and values.

Volumes of Japan's imports of US logs increased by 7.9 per cent in 2015 compared to the previous year, from 1.79 million cubic metres to 1.94 million cubic metres. That of US lumber grew by 8.6 per cent, from 317,370 cubic metres to 347,396 cubic metres, while values of US lumber imports improved by 3.2 per cent in 2015 compared to the previous year.

Japan's imports of Canadian logs, by volume, dropped by 28.7 per cent in 2015 compared to the previous year, from 1.17 million cubic metres to 830,827 cubic metres. Volumes of Canadian lumber imports grew by 0.1 per cent, to 2.02 million cubic metres, while values improved by 0.2 per cent.

Major Railway Trestle Bridge Fire in Alberta

Police in Mayerthorpe, AB, said the fire that destroyed the CN Rail trestle bridge started under suspicious circumstances, according to *CBC* Wednesday. The fire is the fifth the local RCMP detachment has been called to in the past 30 days.

Crews responded to 17 fires locally in the last seven days, all wildland or grass fires. The largest and most serious fire destroyed the CN bridge Tuesday, forcing the evacuation of the nearby school.

Interfor, out of Vancouver, BC, recorded adjusted EBITDA of \$33.4 million on sales of \$433.9 million in 1Q 2016 compared to \$35.8 million on sales of \$411.4 million in 4Q 2015, the company announced Thursday.



Export Development Canada Reduces Forecast

Export Development Canada has slashed its forecast of goods exports this year to 2 per cent, down from a previous estimate of 7 per cent.

While natural resources continue to struggle under lower prices and sluggish demand, double-digit growth in consumer goods, automotive, and aerospace sectors will drive Canada's overall exports to grow by two per cent this year, according to a new global export forecast by EDC.

CN Rail Trestle Bridge Fire

CONT'D FROM PG 2 CN crews spent the day Wednesday clearing away the debris of the burned structure in Alberta.

CN ran one train a day on that line, and is now examining options to restore the line to service, said spokesperson Kate Fenske to *CBC* Wednesday.

Cornel Notenboom, president of ANC Transloading, said to the *Edmonton Journal* also Wednesday the loss Tuesday of the railway line will cause delays

"This is a very large inconvenience for us," Notenboom said. "We're anticipating doing a fairly large job in May that may get delayed."

ANC Transloading focusses on moving material for the fracking industry in Fox Creek, but has recently expanded to transloading pipe for the new pipeline project from Fox Creek to Namao by Pembina Pipeline.

After five fires in the last 10 days, RCMP are looking to the public for help.

Mayerthorpe RCMP and CN Rail are still investigating the cause of the fire and have no leads, but Cpl. Grant Kneller said it is being treated as an arson investigation.

Forest Company Quarterly Reports 2016

Interfor produced an additional 50 million board feet in 1Q 2016 versus 4Q 2015. The production increased mainly due to the return to a normal operating schedule at the Castlegar, BC, sawmill, and the improvement in weather conditions near the Georgetown, SC, sawmill.

Monteal, QC's, Domtar Corp reported quarterly earnings results also Thursday. The company reported \$0.35 earnings per share for the quarter. The company posted revenue of US\$1,287 million in the period. The company's revenue was down -2.1 per cent compared to the same quarter last year. During the same quarter in the previous year, the company posted \$0.75

Norbord, out of Toronto, ON, Friday reported adjusted EBITDA of US\$61 million for 1Q 2016, versus US\$16 million in 1Q 2015 and US\$57 million in 4Q 2015. The year-over-year improvement is primarily due to higher North American OSB prices and shipment volumes, and the weaker Canadian dollar. North American operations generated Adjusted EBITDA of US\$53 million in the quarter compared to US\$11 million in the same quarter last year

and US\$51 million in the prior quarter.

Conifex, Dunkley Sign

Conifex Timber, out of Vancouver, BC, signed a cooperation agreement on timber harvesting activities in the Mackenzie Timber Supply Area with Hixon, BC, saw-milling company Dunkley Lumber on 12 April, Conifex announced Friday. According to the terms of the agreement, Dunkley acquires 50 per cent of the shares in an undisclosed subsidiary of Conifex at a price of C\$20 million. This subsidiary has felling licences for 300,000 cubic metres per year.





Export Development Canada Forecast: 2016 and 2017

A cluster of Canadian sectors is likely to do very well this year, including autos, consumer goods, aerospace, and machinery-and-equipment, according to a twice-yearly forecast by EDC, the federal government's export lender.

But that strength is being offset by a commodities price collapse that is proving to be unexpectedly deep and prolonged, EDC chief economist Peter Hall said.

He insisted that the export recovery is coming, but it's been delayed. EDC is calling for 6-per-cent export growth in 2017.

Export Outlook

The EDC's weaker export outlook is in line with that of Bank of Canada Governor Stephen Poloz, who is also cautious about the year ahead. Poloz has been warning that a long list of obstacles could derail Canada's economic prospects, including a downturn in the global economy, weak business investment and a recent rebound in the Canadian dollar.

Canada's economy continues to show evidence of a split personality.

On the up side, Hall pointed to strong expected gains this year in exports of autos (up 10 per cent), forestry (up 5 per cent), aerospace (up 13 per cent) and consumer goods (up 14 per cent). All of these sectors are getting a lift from the lower value of the Canadian dollar.

Forestry


In the near term EDC Economics believes that the relative weakness of the loonie against the US dollar, US demand growth and stronger prices will result in 5 per cent growth of Canadian forestry exports in 2016 and 6 per cent growth in 2017.

EDC Economics forecasts that this will continue, with housing starts reaching just over 1.2 million units in 2016 and nearly 1.4 million units in 2017. This will sustain the strong demand for lumber and wood paneling for construction and consumer use in the US.

EDC Economics forecasts that this supply constraint will result in higher prices for Canadian lumber over the medium term, resulting in the total value of lumber exports increasing even as export volume levels diminish.
